Graduation Programme

Two ceremonies take place on the Parade Ground. Firstly the Graduation Parade of the Corps of Staff Cadets and secondly the conferring of University of New South Wales degrees and presentation of the Royal Military College diplomas to the graduating class.

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Today, cadets of the First Class parade at Duntroon for the last time before they receive their Sovereign's Commission. They form up in front of the remainder of the Corps and they are the first to march past.

After the Advance in Review Order, the Inspecting Officer and party move from the dais to seats on the terrace, to view the brief ceremony of 'Farewell to First Class'.

Their last parade at Duntroon ended, the Graduating Class march off the parade ground in slow time to the strains of 'Auld Lang Syne', followed by the 'Maori Farewell'. The Sovereign's Company, with Queen Elizabeth the Second's Banner, march off. The remainder then march off under command of the senior cadet of the Second Class.

The Graduation Ceremony will follow immediately after the Parade. His Excellency the Governor-General will address the Corps, then present the Sword of Honour and the Queen's Medal.

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In 1967, the College entered into an affiliation with the University of New South Wales, and the University established the Faculty of Military Studies at Duntroon. The first students were admitted to the Faculty in 1968; those members of the Graduating Class who have completed courses in the Faculty will be graduating with the University's Degrees of Bachelor of Arts in Military Studies, Bachelor of Science in Military Studies, or Bachelor of Engineering.

The ceremony of conferring degrees is a Graduation Ceremony of the University and is held on the parade ground under its aegis. The Chancellor of the University will admit the graduands to the three degrees.

At the invitation of the College, the Chancellor will also present the Diploma of Military Studies to those members of the Graduating Class entitled to receive it.

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On completion of the ceremonies on the parade ground, morning tea will be served in Duntroon Gardens for the Graduating Class, their guests, and the staff and guests of the College and in the Corps of Staff Cadets Mess for cadets and their guests.

THE COLOURS

Origin of the Colours

Since earliest times, warriors have carried standards or flags as an identification symbol and to serve as a rallying point during battle. Today the Colours embody the spirit and tradition of the Regiment to which they belong. They are highly valued, carefully guarded and treated with great respect.

Seniority of the Colours

Arising from this ancient tradition, infantry battalions carry two Colours. The Queen's and the Regimental. The Queen's Colour is a reminder to all ranks of their loyalty and duty to their Sovereign and country and is the Senior Colour. The Regimental Colour is a symbol of Regimental tradition and of the loyalty of all members to the Regiment.

The original colours were first presented to the Corps of Staff Cadets by His Majesty King George VI when, as Duke of York, he visited Australia in 1927. Colours were re-presented by Her Majesty the Queen on 17 February 1954 and again on 27 April 1970.

The Old Colours have been laid up on each occasion, the first at the Church of St John the Baptist in Canberra and the second at the Anzac Memorial Chapel of St Paul at Duntroon.

According to custom, before the Colours were presented, they were first consecrated, dedicated and blessed by the Chaplains-General of the Church of England, Roman Catholic and Protestant denominations.

Queen Elizabeth the Second's Banner

When Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II visited RMC in 1954, she graciously approved that henceforth the title 'The Sovereign's Company' should be bestowed on the Champion Company of cadets each year. Her Majesty subsequently gave permission for her Banner to be carried by the Sovereign's Company on ceremonial occasions.

Queen Elizabeth the Second's Banner was presented to the Corps of Staff Cadets on 26 February 1958 by Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth The Queen Mother. Queen Elizabeth the Second's Banner is accorded similar honours to those accorded to the Queen's and Regimental Colours.

The Champion Company is decided by a summation of all inter-company competition conducted during the year. Sporting competitions are held in Athletics, Australian Rules, Basketball, Cricket, Hockey, Tennis, Rugby, Soccer, Swimming, Squash and Water Polo. Other competitions held are Cross Country, Drill, Obstacle Course and Small Arms. The Company which wins the highest number of points in sporting competition is awarded the Lee Shield.

The Sovereign's Banner is handed over from one Champion Company to another at Banner Parade, held on the Thursday before Graduation. Last Thursday Gallipoli Company (the Sovereign's Company 1973) handed over the Banner to Alamein Company who are now accorded the title 'The Sovereign's Company'.

The order of seniority of the Companies is The Sovereign's Company, Gallipoli, Kokoda then Kapyong Companies.

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THE FIELD MARSHAL SIR THOMAS BLAMEY MEMORIAL AWARDS

Four cadets, the winner of the Sword of Honour, and the top graduates in Arts, Applied Science and Engineering, have received Blamey Awards for 1973. These awards are in memory of Australia's most distinguished soldier, Field Marshal Sir Thomas Blamey, GBE, KCB, CMG, DSO, ED, and were presented yesterday by the Commandant on behalf of the Trustees.

Field Marshal Blamey was born in Wagga Wagga, New South Wales in 1884. He joined the Regular Army in 1906, and at the start of World War I was a junior staff officer. At its conclusion he was a Brigadier General, and Chief of Staff to Lieutenant-General Sir John Monash, Commander of the Australian Corps.

He left the Regular Army but continued in the Militia between the Wars. At the beginning of World War II he was chosen by the Government to lead the 6th Division overseas. Later he was to command the Australian Corps in the Middle East; the ANZAC Corps in Greece. He was then appointed Deputy Commander-in-Chief Middle East.

On return from the Middle East in March 1942, as Commander-in-Chief of the Australian Military Forces his skilled direction in the fields of organisation, operational and administrative efficiency, and morale, effectively raised the fighting capacity of the forces he commanded. Then, as in the ensuing war years, his outstanding leadership was shown.

As Commander Allied Land Forces South West Pacific Area under General MacArthur he played a foremost part in planning and directing the combined operations which drove the enemy from New Guinea and the Pacific Islands.

He was gazetted Field Marshal in June 1950, the first Australian, and with the exception of Field Marshal Jan Smuts, the only Dominion soldier so honoured. He was then on the eve of his last illness. He died on 27 May 1951. His concluding words live on:

'Australia's sons must be ready to accept whatever responsibilities fall on them and draw strength for their discharge from the traditions of their predecessors. I can no longer lead them, but I commend to you those familiar army words "Carry on" which combine both exhortation and encouragement'.

The Blamey awards are made available by the Trustees of the Field Marshal Sir Thomas Blamey Memorial Fund and the Trustees hope that the recipients of these awards, throughout their service, will themselves demonstrate, and encourage in others, the great qualities of leadership, intelligence, resolution and courage for which the late Field Marshal will always be remembered and revered.
